

# About the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund

The Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund (the Fund) was established in 1961, following the disastrous Dwellingup fires where 123 people were left homeless and the timber towns of Holyoake, Nanga Brook, Marrinup and Banksiadale were completely burnt out.

The Fund was established in conjunction with the State Government to provide financial assistance to individuals for the alleviation and relief of distress, suffering and personal hardships, brought about by any disaster or emergency within Western Australia declared by the Western Australian Government or for which the Fund's Board considers assistance is warranted.

The Fund is incorporated under the *Charitable Collections Act (1946)* and has Australian Taxation Office tax deductibility status. The Fund is administered by an independent Board which consists of up to 11 members.

The City of Perth has supported the Fund since its inception. The City of Perth seeks no reimbursement for the costs associated with providing support to the Fund. 100% of donations raised through appeals goes directly to those in need.

The objects (Rule 3) of the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund are:

- To provide a permanent fund for the alleviation and relief of distress, suffering, hardship and misfortune brought about by any disaster or emergency of a general application which has been declared as such by the relevant West Australian Government agency or department of the time;
- 2. To provide relief and aid as determined by the Board of the Association from time to time to persons undergoing such distress, suffering, hardship or misfortune brought about by any event mentioned in rule 3(1) or as determined by the Board on a case-by-case basis;
- 3. To provide supplementary funds for the alleviation and relief of distress, suffering, hardship or misfortune to any major disaster whether within Western Australia or outside Western Australia where such a disaster has been so determined by any government or statutory authority.

### **Our Activities**

### **Appeals**

During the 2024–25 financial year, the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund did not launch any new appeals. The Fund's activities were therefore focused entirely on the ongoing administration of the Kimberley Floods Appeal.

For the Kimberley Floods Appeal, the Fund remained focused on supporting communities affected by the severe flooding. This involved receiving and assessing applications for financial assistance, allocating funding in line with established criteria, and making payments to individuals and groups to help them recover and rebuild. The Fund worked closely with local authorities and community organisations to ensure that resources were directed where they were most needed, and that the distribution of funds was both timely and transparent.

### **Kimberley Floods 2023 Appeal**

The Kimberley Floods 2023 Appeal was activated by the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund on Monday, 9 January 2023.

The Board contributed \$500,000 of its Reserve funds to the Kimberley Floods Appeal and raised \$12.02m in total donations for flood affected victims.

At 30 June 2025, the Board had pledged \$12.02m of the donations to the following categories of assistance:

### **Our Activities**

### **Kimberley Floods Appeal Disbursements** as of 30 June 2025

During the year 1 July 2024 through to 30 June 2025, the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund (the Fund) continued to provide significant financial assistance to individuals, households, community groups, and affected facilities following the Kimberley Floods disaster. A total of \$12.02m in donations was allocated across various funding categories, and \$10.14m disbursed to eligible applicants by financial year-end.

Funding was directed primarily towards supporting privately owned residential properties, vehicle replacement and repair, essential household fixtures and contents, and priority community facilities.

Support for privately owned residential properties included payments for minor and major property damage, silt removal, fencing replacement, and additional top-up assistance. In total, \$4.50m was allocated to residential properties, all of which had been fully paid by 30 June 2025.

Funding towards 56 vehicle repairs and replacements totalled \$1.89m, with \$1.71m paid to eligible recipients by financial year-end.

A significant portion of funding supported the replacement of fixtures and household contents. At 30 June 2025, \$3.99m had been allocated and \$3.10m paid. This included top-up payments for households that experienced major property damage.

Community infrastructure also received targeted support, including \$107,394 for the Kalyeeda Airstrip and \$775,668 for recovery of Homemaker Centres, of which \$725,503 had been disbursed.

Funding allocations were also allocated for the Balginjirr Community and for pastoral property and fencing repairs, totalling \$769,878. These payments had not yet been disbursed at 30 June 2025 and are expected to be paid as projects progress and eligibility requirements are met.

At financial year-end, unallocated funds of \$952 remained available for distribution.

The Fund continues to work closely with affected communities to ensure that allocated funds are distributed promptly and equitably, supporting recovery and rebuilding across the Kimberley region.
